## A MESSAGE FROM THE HEADTEACHER



Dear Parents and Friends

Although the half term has been a short one, it has also been extremely busy. We have had a great deal happening around the school. The high point of half term was the school production 'A Little Shop of Horrors'. Directed by Miss Melanie Bryan, students from years 9-13 demonstrated their acting, musical, stage handling and technical skills in what proved to be a very witty and 'tongue-in-cheek' production. Congratulations to all of those students for such a splendid performance.

During the course of the half term, we also held our Year 11 Sixth Form Subject Fair and Open Evening. This was an opportunity for Y11 students and their parents to find out all about the courses on offer next year in our Sixth Form. Following half term, we will be holding interviews for students who have applied for Sixth Form.

Y11 students are also busy at the moment completing course work. Course work forms an important component of all GCSE examinations and in many cases accounts for 40% of all examination marks. For those of you with sons and daughters in Y11, please give them every support and encouragement to ensure that they make the published deadlines. To help students in Y11 in preparing for the examinations, we will be publishing next half term, details of all revision sessions on offer for Y11.

We have recently finalised plans for a number of changes to our Key Stage 4 courses that will come into effect from next September. Students commencing their GCSE's in September will all be required to study a half GCSE course in

Information Technology. We believe this will give them valuable understanding and skills in Information Technology that will support them in their learning, and assist them in the work place. We will also be offering one of the new vocational GCSE's, the equivalent of two GCSE's, but which have a more practical basis than the traditional GCSE. More details about courses will be given to students and parents next term.

Work has been ongoing since Christmas on our new Modern Languages IT suite that is set to open after half term. The room is equipped with thirty PCs and will enable students to take full advantage of IT to support them in their languages learning. Work is set to begin very shortly on our new Design and Manufacturing Technology Centre. The project has received planning approval and a contractor has been engaged.

Despite warnings, a number of students continue to attend school wearing items of incorrect uniform. Please could parents make a special effort to ensure that their children are correctly dressed for school. A particular problem lately has been the wearing of sweat tops which of course we do not allow. Thank you for your support on this matter.

Finally, a reminder that our PTA are holding a Quiz night on Friday, 22<sup>nd</sup> February at 7.30 for 8.00 pm. Tickets are available from the school office. I do hope you will be able to attend.

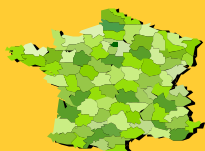

## What's New in 2002?

### PGCE French Teacher



At the beginning of the term Véronique Blanc joined us from the Bristol University Department of Education to carry out a 9 week teaching placement. We are very fortunate to have a “real” French person in the Faculty; not only is she teaching French to our Year 9, 10 and 11 students, but she is also acting as “Assistante” to our Year 12 and 13 students.

Over now to Véronique to have her initial impressions of teaching French at The Kings of Wessex:

“As a student teacher I have to do two teaching practices and The Kings of Wessex is my second one. When I arrived for my first visit to the school I was quite apprehensive. As a French citizen, it would be the first time that I’d set foot in an English Comprehensive. I had previously been a language assistant for many years in a small, independent school for girls in Bristol and my teaching placement prior to Kings had been at Sidcot. In both schools I never had more than 15 pupils per class. My first thought on arriving at Kings was:

“How am I going to remember all their names?” Fighting against the flow of pupils in the corridor at break time and being an average sized southern French person, I thought: “Dear me, isn’t everyone tall in Somerset?”

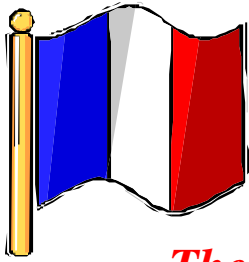
Teaching here so far has been a great experience. I had been told, both by my university tutors and the previous student teacher, that I was very lucky to have been sent to The Kings of Wessex. I do not want to say that there aren’t bad days, especially when it’s the last period of the day and some of my Year 10 (you know who you are!) are already thinking about the weekend ahead (and it’s only Monday!). It does not matter how cross I am with them, I still find it hard sometimes to keep a straight face when I hear some of their remarks. (Dear parents, how can you ever outwit your children?)

I am certainly learning a lot, particularly with very professional colleagues, always supportive and encouraging. I hope that I will be able to bring a little breath of “French” air, but what I hope for mostly is that my next job will be in a school as good as The Kings of Wessex.”

## *The Loire Atlantique Mini-Assistant Scheme*

This year some of our Year 12 AS Level French students will be participating in the "Mini-Assistant Scheme." They will be spending ten days in primary schools in the Loire Atlantique area where they will be teaching English as a foreign language. The students will stay with teachers and other members of the community, thus giving them the ideal
