Beekeeper

Also known as:

Apiarist, apiculturist

Beekeepers manage colonies of honeybees kept in hives to produce honey, beeswax and royal jelly. You can find out more about becoming a beekeeper through <u>The British Beekeepers Association</u> and the <u>National Bee</u> Unit.

You can get into this job through:

You could do a college course, which would teach you some of the skills you need to get into beekeeping.	You can keep bees as a hobby and learn how to successfully set up and manage healthy colonies of honeybees.
There are short introductory courses for beginners as well as ones that lead to a qualification, like the Level 1 Award in Introduction to Beekeeping.	You can also join a beekeeping group where you'll learn from experienced beekeepers, and work towards qualifications offered by The British Beekeepers Association.


Labour Market Information (LMI)

Labour Market Information describes any information used to make informed decisions about the labour market.

It can help you:

- Determine which jobs are available in our area and further afield
- Ascertain the number of people in particular jobs
- Discover occupations that are growing or declining
- Identify which jobs are in demand and that pay more
- Work out which subjects to pick for Level 2 (GCSE/BTEC/OCR) and Level 3 (A Level/BTEC/OCR) to help you get into a career.

Employability Skill of the Term

Most employers look for certain skills and qualities in job candidates in addition to academic qualifications. Known as employability skills, these skills may not be job-specific, but they play an important role in improving your performance and value in the workplace.

Employers have high regard for employability skills because they are much harder to teach than job-specific skills. Some employable qualities come naturally, while others can be acquired through education, work, or daily practice. You may already have some of the key employment skills, but you can work to improve those skills and develop new ones. In each edition of Employability Matters we will explore the employability skills that employers look for.

Valuing Diversity & Difference

To have this skill, you must be accepting of how other people do things, and value diversity and what it can bring. This can be demonstrated by working with people who may be able to offer different skills or knowledge, and who offer a different perspective to your own. Everyone learns differently and takes different approaches to different things, and it is important to listen to and respect other's views and opinions.
