University Course of the Term

Each term we will showcase a degree course offered at the university of the month to inspire and inform you.

Pharmacology BSc (Hons)

Pharmacology is the study of how drugs affect body functions in health and disease. It plays a vital role in helping to safeguard our health and welfare. BSc Pharmacology explores approaches to treatment. These approaches have a focus on neuroscience, metabolic disease, and cancer. These are all research strengths at the University of Dundee.

On the course you'll focus on topics like molecular pharmacology and quantitative pharmacology. You will learn how drugs behave depending on various factors. This gives you an understanding of how scientists explore biomedical discoveries. You will learn how scientists develop them from initial innovation to real-world application.

Our course curriculum is shaped by the work of our world-leading researchers to make sure you're learning the latest advances. This will also help you gain an understanding of the fundamentals of the field.

Counsellor

Alternative titles for this job include therapist. Counsellors help people discuss their problems and feelings in a confidential setting.

Day-to-day tasks

As a counsellor, you could use different types of therapy to:

- agree what will be covered in sessions and keep records
- build trust with a client in person, online or over the phone
- listen carefully, ask questions and check understanding
- help your client to talk about their feelings, see things clearer and find ways to cope
- empathise but challenge when necessary

You could work with individuals, couples, families, or groups.

Working environment

You could work in a therapy clinic, at a GP practice, at a school, at a college or from home. Your working environment may be emotionally demanding.

Employability Skill of the Term

Most employers look for certain skills and qualities in job candidates in addition to academic qualifications. Known as employability skills, these skills may not be job-specific, but they play an important role in improving your performance and value in the workplace.

Employers have high regard for employability skills because they are much harder to teach than job-specific skills. Some employable qualities come naturally, while others can be acquired through education, work, or daily practice. You may already have some of the key employment skills, but you can work to improve those skills and develop new ones. In each edition of Employability Matters we will explore the employability skills that employers look for.

Resilience

Resilience is the ability to face and adapt to challenges to overcome them. A person with strong resilience skills can handle disappointments because they don't let setbacks keep them from progressing. Like other people, they experience difficulties and stress, but they experience those factors more positively and don't allow them to impede success. For example, a resilient person who receives a rejection email for a job may feel discouraged but also determined to apply what they have learned from the experience to the next job application.
