



Revision and Support

Ineffective revision techniques:

- Reading through notes or text books covers lots of ground quickly (but little is recalled).
- Highlighting maybe of use to 'highlight' important points to come back to, but of little use by itself.
- Making notes and summarising needs to be done well before it is effective. Lots of people simply copy.





Revision and Support

Effective revision techniques:


The best revision is when you <u>recall</u> information, so students should be testing themselves or revising with a friend and testing each other.

Flashcards	Use these with questions on one side and answers on the other, repeatedly quizzing yourself without looking at the answers.
Summarising	Close your resources and try to recall and summarise what you've learned by writing it down or speaking it aloud.
Practice testing	Actively answer questions from past papers or create your own to test your knowledge and identify gaps in your understanding.
Blurting	After a study session, quickly write down everything you can remember about a topic, in any order, without looking at your notes. Then check your notes to see what you missed.



Revision and Support

Revising little and often, starting now!



Reviewing information at increasing intervals, known as spaced repetition, is an effective strategy for long-term memory retention.

Regular review of learned information, especially in the early stages, can help to mitigate memory loss.

The steepest drop in memory retention happens immediately after learning something new.

Research and Using References

- The research you do may involve looking for information in published sources such as textbooks, encyclopaedias, journals, TV, radio and on the internet.
- The regulations state that: 'the work which you submit for assessment must be your own'; 'you must not copy from someone else or allow another candidate to copy from you' this includes online references
- If you use the same wording, you must add **quotation marks to** the phrase and supply the reference.
- You must make sure that you give **detailed references** for everything in your work which is not in your own words.

Al tools create text by learning from data from the internet, however it can make things up and be biased.

If you use AI in an assessment and declare it as your own work this is malpractice. Sanctions include (but are not limited to) loss of marks or even disqualification from the qualification.







Language Paper 1 Writing Support:

Drop your reader in to the middle of the action/setting.

Shift your perspective, time or location.

Zoom in on tiny detail/ give a close description of a particular focus/object/person

Link back to opening (cyclical narrative) or to the future.

Here's a story using the DROP, SHIFT, ZOOM, LINK structure, based on the war picture below.


<u>Drop</u> – Billowing ash clouds enshrouded the sky over his head. He charged violently through the open space. Darting in and out of explosions, his face was steeled with concentration as he rushed towards anything that resembled a sanctuary for his fatigued body. Finally, in amongst the chaos and mayhem, he saw a spot to which he ran. He dropped down into the burrow like a dazed rabbit.

<u>Shift</u> – Racing through his mind were memories of the summer. When the sun beamed down on where he sat. Birds were chirping a chorus tune and, beside him, the most enchanting woman of all. In her company he felt the warmth of summer embrace him and consume his heart. Her azure eyes, her coquettish smile – she was a goddess that made him feel as though he had arrived at God's gates. He strained to think of her voice, the sound of her hum...

Zoom – Shells thundered around him. Fire blasted in front of him. Sending him back to the hole in which he cowered. He slowly peeped his head up. Swivelling around, he could see the battlefield. Grass frazzled from heat. Blown body parts, possibly of friends, were heaped together in tight bundles.

<u>Link</u> — He lifted himself up from the dirt and found <u>all</u> of the strength within him to bolt once more towards the enemy lines. He ran. Heart heavily beating against his chest. Breathing rapidly. He ran and ran. Until eventually his figure had been lost in the gulf of ominous ash clouds that enveloped the field.

How to revise for literature:

- Know the texts: reread the book, listen to the audiobook, watch a film or play
- Create your own revision materials: flashcards, mind maps, 30 circles sheets, quizzes
- Test your knowledge and revise any gaps
- Remember the importance of non-quote methods; they want to hear the student's response to the question, not a list of memorised quotes
- Plan the answer with a thesis statement included
- Complete past questions and bring them in for marking!







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The building of the windmill symbolises the hopes and failings of Animalism. Under Snowball's leadership the creation of the windmill seeks to better the lives of all the animals; he promises a three-day working week, electricity and heating. But as Orwell shows, under Napoleon's dictatorship, this dream fails, which serves as a direct allegory for communism in post-revolution Russia. The windmill only causes further hardship for the animals, with Boxer being worked to death. What Orwell is showing, is that the equality that communism seeks to establish fails because of political corruption, greed and lust for power.





 - TOP TIP concentrate on one topic at a time.




